The Lions Club of Swanwick are responding to the need for a defibrillator at Locksheath Shopping Centre by working with the Centre Management and the local community to install a "Defib" on the clock tower in the Centre.

this initiative collects, sorts, and distributes used spectacles to clinics and eye camps in communities throughout Africa, India and eastern Europe. This year, Swanwick Lions collected 924 pairs of spectacles and sent them to Chichester Lions for sorting. The items from Lions Clubs throughout Europe are then sent to Medico France in Le Havre, where they are graded and packed in plastic wallets, and distributed via Lions Clubs to those who need them.
